Secured web pages include login pages and registration. Web browsers that will no longer be supported include Internet Explorer version 10 and earlier. All users will need to access these pages using Internet Explorer 11 or higher, Chrome, or Firefox.

New resources at QMUL

he Library has recently set up access to a number of important resources:

- Following a very successful trial period in December 2017, the Library has now subscribed to ProQuest Academic Complete, a package of more than 140,000 e-books on all subjects, from Architecture to Zoology.
- The Oxford English Dictionary features 600,000 words, 3 million quotations, and over 1000 years of English
- Oxford language Dictionaries in French, German, Spanish, Russian and Portuguese
- A full subscription to the Oxford Very Short Introductions series, a very popular resource that offers concise and original introductions to a wide range of subjects, from Islam to Sociology, Politics to Classics, and Literary Theory to History.

Definitely an exciting time for new electronic resources!

Science & Engineering drop-ins

The Teaching and Learning Support Team dropped in on Science and Engineering students from 5 February 2018 to 16 February 2018. They visited spaces such as the Engineering



and Joseph Priestley buildings, and the Information Technology Lab. Armed with lots of freebies, they managed to engage several hundred students and staff.

Moreover, they managed to collect more than 200 survey responses, giving further direction on how to support Science and Engineering students. When collated, they aim to share the results with the wider QMUL Science and Engineering learning community.

During the drop-ins they promoted their research skills support work with the taught students and early career researchers, especially the workshops they are running for taught students in March.

CLA audit

On Thursday 15 February, the Copyright Licencing Agency (CLA) visited QMUL to perform an audit. QMUL has a licence with the CLA which allows articles produced by participating publishers to be included in course

packs and scanned onto QMPlus within certain limitations. (Scans uploaded on Reading Lists Online are automatically checked for compliance with the CLA Licence). Information about the CLA licence can be found on the Library's copyright pages at <u>http://library.qmul.ac.uk/research/copyright/</u>.

During the day, the CLA asked about QMUL's copyright policies, checked on QMPlus that selected scans were compliant and toured the campus to check that information about the licence was displayed near photocopiers and scanners. The CLA will now produce a report which will list recommendations to help compliance with their licence.

are proposing and discussing some changes to the format and structure of future LUF meetings to help us achieve these aims.

- Open the attendance of LUF meetings to all QMUL students and staff. Our current student and staff reps will continue to be very welcome at future LUF meetings many thanks for your valuable input to date!
- Going forward, Kate Price, the QMUL University Librarian will chair LUF. Kate is a member of the Education Quality and Standards Board and Chair of the Library Management Group and is excellently placed to oversee the activities and outcomes of LUF.
- Vary the content and approach to LUF meetings we plan to start LUF meetings with some formal business. This will be followed by activities, discussions and/or workshops about themed areas of interest.
- Improve our marketing, publicity and outreach make it clear how to get involved in LUF, what it is like attending a LUF meeting, and to promote the impact of LUF to a wider audience within QMUL.
- Improve opportunities for those who attend LUF meetings to provide us with feedback.

It is our intention that the outcomes of LUF meetings will be discussed by the Library Senior Management Team, the Director of Student Services, Executive Officers from QMSU and members of Staff-Student Liaison Committees, and will go on to inform discussion and decision making at a range of forums at QMUL.

There will be a transitional meeting with a theme of "Your Ideal Space for Study" held on Wednesday 07 March, 2 - 3.30pm, in the Mile End Library First Floor Training Room (1). This meeting will be open to all QMUL staff and students. It will start with some formal business, including minutes and actions and a brief report from a member of the Library Senior Management Team, followed by an open discussion about the proposed terms of reference and format of future LUF meetings, and our Library spaces at QMUL.



Student competition

n the autumn of 2017 the Library was involved in running a student competition to design a product to get research into professional discussions. The competition was organised by Dr Dominic Hurst, Senior

Clinical Lecturer in Primary Dental Care, and Paula Funnell, Faculty Liaison Librarian for Medicine & Dentistry. Library staff were instrumental in securing sponsorship for prizes from an academic publishing company. The competition was judged by Dr Clare Morris, Reader in Medical Education Research & Development and Head of Research in the Institute of Health Sciences Education, and Jon Brassey, creator of the TRIP Database, a leading Evidence Based Medicine tool.

The competition was won by Kelvin Miu, a final year medical undergraduate, for his Discuss Med mobile app. He was presented with his prize in the library at Whitechapel before Christmas.
